Tony Aronica, standing in for Doug Sutherland, Commissioner of Public Lands, even drove all the way over from Olympia. The candidates were welcomed with delicious cookies (thank you Faye Krenkel and Chuck Hunter), warm beverages, and the interest of about fifteen neighbors from the Foothills area. Each candidate had 6 minutes to introduce themselves and



highlight some of the issues that were important to them. Sheriff Ozzie Knezovich acted as the Master of Ceremonies and added his own comments at the end. He emphasized the importance of all of these offices in terms of public safety and the need for each citizen

to carefully consider the qualifications of each candidate. All of the candidates represented at the Forum were well qualified by education, experience, sincerity, and dedication to public service. After the presentations the audience had a chance to ask questions and a few lively discussions followed. Penny Lancaster and Chuck Hunter organized the event for the Foothills Community and had sent invitations to all the candidates that will be on our ballot for the General Election. Having a chance to meet your candidates and let them hear your concerns is an important part of the democratic process.

FIRE DISTRICT 9 ALARM REPORT

January 1 - September 30, 2008



Excluding vehicle accidents with injury,
Firefighters responded to twenty EMS calls, which required
either advanced life support (ALS) or basic life support (BLS).
There were three motor vehicle accidents with injuries which
also required ALS or BLS. Other vehicle accident reports were
simply investigated. Investigations were conducted for both
unauthorized and authorized controlled burnings; unintentional
smoke detector activations and a downed power line. Another
downed power line had fire district 9 providing manpower; in
July firefighters worked to control a wild land fire. Additional
blaze responses were to brush fires, an outside rubbish fire
and a passenger vehicle fire, all of which were extinguished by
service personnel. Adding to the total number of the 53 incident
count were a minor number of dispatched and cancelled calls.

THE FRA TODAY

What is the Foothills Rural Association? Editor, Faye Krenkel asked for a short article on just what is the FRA today. Contrary to belief, I was not present when the earth cooled, I am not as old as dirt, and I have not been here since Christ was a corporal. But I do have some fond memories of the FRA and some of its many activities.

For example, way back in 1989, the FRA had its first Foothills Fun Run and Walk. The goal was a beautiful sunny Saturday morning Run /Walk with the many neighbors of the Foothills Community. Per request, beautiful weather was procured, and we walked and ran the current course before our Pancake Breakfast. We must have had about a hundred participants, and Cheryl and I produced a mountain adorned T-shirt that was popular with all. We've had perfect weather for each of those 20 runs. I think that Dale Nilson was the FRA president at that time. Dale was one of the earliest Founders of the FRA. He and his brother John and others were moved to action when a land use action was proposed by a kennel. (Please note that this was NOT the Marcinda Kennel). When that land issue died and the Fire Department acquired the current schoolhouse (FRA Community Center) site, saving the historic community landmark, and at the same time, creating a neighborhood center, conserving local history as well as providing a venue for community functions and private events became the purpose of the FRA. The Nilsons, Mike Atwood, Del Schmitt, and others and their families spent hundreds of hours reclaiming and updating the "old schoolhouse" into a valued neighborhood asset. The far-sighted efforts of those founders as well as the Fire Department have ensured the use for years to come.

In those days we had carnivals, community yard sales, bazaars, and many family events. Today we still have many functions and events. You have probably attended at least a couple of the gatherings. We still have the Fun Run, usually in early June. The Britton's, the Lea's, the Wolf's, and Holly Weiler have lead those functions for the past 20 years. I cannot possibly remember all of the volunteers that have contributed time and participation to the Run and to the Breakfast, too.

First thing in the spring, we have a community yard sale, which enables swapping of "precious junk" between neighbors. Refreshing the FRA Center, repairs, and other maintenance is another of our responsibilities. In May, the FRA Scholarship Committee assembles applications, completes interviews, and awards funding for Foothills students to further their educations. I have lead this group for many years and the FRA has awarded dozens of thousands of dollars to some of the brightest, hardworking, diverse, and pretty awesome kids (and adults) in our community. Through correspondence and reports by residents, we have learned of some impressive accomplishments of our very local, home-grown citizens, which have produced doctors, teachers, pilots, scientists, counselors, engineers, and health professionals. The original seed money was given to the FRA by lifetime resident, Jess Kronquist; the scholarship carries his name in memoriam.

In July we provide food for the Foothills Church Foothills Family Fun Festival. At a very nominal charge, we provide round the clock food such as the "Hot dog deal" and the "hamburger deal" meals, plus beverages; the intent is to make it so that children and parents can enjoy a play day without having to leave to eat. The family together time is our goal. After summer activities, we have our tribute to the founding fathers (and moms) of the area. Founder's Day was a suggestion of Joyce Roskelley many years ago to recognize, reacquaint with, and connect with living and deceased members of our community. Holly Weiler and others have become historians and have worked to assemble and relate the past to us today. In order to facilitate that, the FRA has provided free of charge a Longhorn dinner so that the evening's focus is on real people that shaped our region's past. Many of the past generations have related anecdotes about Foothills past such as the gathering of patients for tonsillectomies at the Foothills School or the show-casing of local classical autos and their skilled owners.

Later at the end of October is Harvest celebration. On Halloween, in conjunction with the Foothills church, we have a Chili feed. This year we served at least 225 people approximately 27 gallons of chili and fixin's, again at no charge. Chilies of the past have included Elk chili, white wild turkey chili, and of course four alarm chili, plus special family recipes made by individuals.

Through surveys, we have determined that the most valued activity of our organization is the newsletter. Faye Krenkel currently leads this endeavor. Finding out about local issues and participating in the community's activities is facilitated by this newsletter sent to every known house in the Foothills. If you're not reading this now please let Faye know so that she may add you to the circulation. Approximately 1/3 of the Foothills households are members of the FRA. If you want to learn more or want to otherwise contribute to our community, please attend any meeting, especially the January General Membership meeting. The evolution and rejuvenation of the FRA depends on new people as well as its lifetime residents.

QUICK TREE FACTS

There are approximately 25-30 million Real Christmas Trees sold in the U.S. every year. There are close to half a billion Real Christmas Trees currently growing on Christmas Tree farms in the U.S. alone, all planted by farmers. North American Real Christmas Trees are grown in all 50 states and Canada. Eighty percent (80%) of artificial trees worldwide are manufactured in China, according to the U.S. Commerce Department. Real Trees are a renewable, recyclable resource. Artificial trees contain non-biodegradable plastics and possible metal toxins such as lead. There are more than 4,000 Christmas tree recycling programs throughout the United States. For every Real Christmas Tree harvested, up to 3 seedlings are planted in its place the following spring. There are about 500,000 acres in production for growing Christmas Trees in the U.S.; much of it preserving green space. There are about 21,000 Christmas Tree growers in the U.S., and over 100,000 people employed full or part-time in the industry. It can take as many as 15 vears to grow a tree of typical height (6 - 7 feet) or as little as 4 years, but the average growing time is 7 years. The top Christmas Tree producing states are Oregon, North Carolina, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Washington. The top selling Christmas Trees are: balsam fir, Douglas-fir, Fraser fir, noble fir, Scotch pine, Virginia pine and white pine.

Artificial Christmas Trees

Towards the end of the 1800's, another variation of the traditional Christmas tree appeared: the artificial Christmas tree. Artificial trees originated in Germany. Metal wire trees were covered with goose, turkey, ostrich or swan feathers. The feathers were often died green to imitate pine needles. In the 1930's, the Addis Brush Company created the first artificial-brush trees, using the same machinery that made their toilet brushes! The Addis 'Silver Pine' tree was patented in 1950. The Christmas tree was designed to have a revolving light source under it and colored gels allowed the light to shine in different shades.

The purposes of the corporation are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6: to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents to assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area: to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20 per year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

A Community Crime Log has been established in an effort to increase community awareness about crime occurring in our area. The crime log will be published in the newsletter. 
