

# <u>Fune Balcom Remembered</u> <u>First Editor/Writer of the</u> <u>Foothills Rural Association Newsletter</u>

June Balcom, age 75, of Forker Road died suddenly on February 9, 1998. Active in the Foothills Rural Association from its formation, June wrote and edited the Newsletter for nearly ten years from the first issue in December, 1983 through March 1992. Even after this, June, and her husband Cliff, continued to handle all the address labeling, collating, and mail sorting of the newsletter until just last year. Both attended nearly every event sponsored by the Foothills Rural Association over the years.

June was preceded in death by a daughter, Kathy Rohrback, in 1989. She is survived by Kathy's family, two other daughters and their families including the Storey family on Piper Road, and her husband of 57 years. The Foothills Rural Association will certainly miss June's long-standing dedication and support.

## FIRE DISTRICT 9 MAKES CHANGES IN DISPATCH OPERATIONS AND STATION 6 SERVICE BOUNDARIES

Effective January 1, 1998, Fire District 9 dispatch operations were merged into a new Combined Communications Center (CCC) which serves all of Spokane County as well as the southern portion of Stevens County. On that date, District 9 dispatchers became Spokane City employees and began working in the new CCC located in the city's former fire dispatch facility.

Another change, made last fall, moved the western boundary of the area served by Foothills Station 6 approximately one mile east. former western boundary was a line running north-south approximately parallel with Lehman The new western boundary is a line running north-south approximately parallel with Tracy Road and the west end of Piper Road. This change was made following the completion of the new Mead Station which is a 24-hour staffed facility offering a quicker response time to the area, located mostly below the bluff, bordering Peone Prairie. At the same time there were some minor adjustments made to the north and east boundaries of the area served by Station 6. These changes insure emergency and fire services to some areas of new development north of Mt. Spokane Park Road and on the east side of Norman Road.

#### BIRDS OF THE FOOTHILLS by Ron Dexter

### **HUMMINGBIRDS**

Well, get out your Hummingbird feeders if you haven't already. They should be out early in March to recharge the migrants that are just arriving or moving through our area.

These smallest of birds come several thousand miles from South American and southern Mexico to breed and raise their young. So fill your feeders with sugar water - no coloring please!

We have three species of Hummingbirds here in the Foothills. The Rufous, the Caliope, and the Black-chinned. The Rufous is the largest and is the most dominate. The male is the most spectacular hummer with its bright reddishorange color - especially the gorget on its throat. The male Rufous usually goes off on his own after the female starts incubating the eggs. That's why they are seldom seen in the summer time.

The Black-chinned male has the black chin that changes to bright violet at the bottom in the throat area. This is best seen when the light hits it just right. This middle sized hummer usually appears slimmer than the other two species.

The smallest hummer of the three is the Caliope. They appear to be all belly or rolly-polly. The male's gorget on the chin is purple-red and is flared or streaked rather than solid like the other males.

The three females are more difficult to describe, so you should consult your bird book. Size is your clue. When the young start arriving at your feeder, in late summer, identification becomes much more confusing.

#### FEEDER MIX

It's very important to have the right ratio of sugar to water. Here is how to prepare it. Bring 4 cups of water to a light boil on the stove or in the microwave oven. Then add 1 cup of sugar and stir until dissolved. Allow to cool before filling your feeder. It may be a good idea to fill your feeder only halfway until the humors are using it regularly. Store the remainder in the refrigerator.

If you hang more than one feeder, try placing them on different sides of the house so that the boss number can't guard all feeders at once. Be sure to hang them where you can see them from inside the house.

During the summer time, when it is hot outside, the water in the mix may evaporate, causing the mix to become syrupy. This is not good for the humors and they may not drink it. Use that solution to water your plants! Put it on a

different plant each time or spread it around. The plants will love it!

If you have a drippy feeder, you can place a catch can beneath and pour that on your plants (or hang the feeder over a bush). This may keep the ants on the bush instead of in your feeder. Insects in your feeder holes are the main reason they leak, so clean out those holes once in a while in hot, soapy water and rinse well.

If your feeders attract too many bees, you can hang a bee trap with hummingbird mix in it nearby. Use the unused mix out of your feeders and refill your feeders with fresh mix. Be sure to add a couple drops of dishwater soap to the bee trap mix. This will kill the bees faster, reducing the chances of escape.

Keep your feeders up through September so that northern hummers that are migrating through our area have a chance to refill on their trip back south.

#### **ROAD SAFETY REMINDER**

With spring weather upon us early this year, area farmers are already heading to the fields. Please be patient when you encounter farm equipment on the road. Slow down. Don't follow too closely. If you see large equipment coming toward you, slow down, and, if possible, pull over to the side of the road (or pull into a driveway) until the equipment has passed.
