

The Foothills Rural Association was established as a non-profit corporation under section 502(C)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code on December 12, 1983. The purposes of the corporation are: to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6; to protect the area from environmental depredation; to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents may assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area; to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20./year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

BIRDS OF THE FOOTHILLS by Ron Dexter

GO SEE -- THE BALD EAGLES CATCH FISH

Our national bird since 1789, Bald Eagles visit the Foothills every winter from November through March. They come down from up north to feed on Carrion in our area. The Bald Eagle was nearing extinction in the United States. This was mainly due to poisoning as a result of eating fish and animals that had been exposed to DDT. The DDT affected birds' egg shells, causing them to break prematurely.

Bald Eagle nests can be huge. They add to them each season. A famous Bald Eagle nest at Vermilion, Ohio measured eight and a half feet in diameter, twelve feet in depth, and weighed about two tons.

Eagles cover a large area each day, as necessary, to find enough to eat. By soaring a mile high, they can see a long way to spot scavengers like ravens, vultures, coyotes etc., that are gathering to eat on deer carcasses or other food.

Eagles are not a pure scavenger like the vultures because they can capture live rabbits, ducks, fish etc. They can carry up to 10 pounds. They are a truly magnificent bird with a 6' to 8' wingspan. They stand 3' tall. Your table top is only 2 1/2'. Bald Eagles are a large dark bird with a huge white head & neck and a white tail. The immatures are brown with scattered white on the underside of their wings.



If you would like to watch Bald Eagles at their best, I suggest that you visit Wolf Lodge Bay and Beauty Bay on Lake Coeur d'Alene to watch them catching fish. Take I-90 six miles east of Coeur d'Alene to exit 22. Turn right to the viewing areas. I was there on the 2nd of this month and saw approximately 20 Eagles. I watched several of them catch fish and saw

several sparring matches between the Eagles as they tumbled in the air.

You can watch them from the two Mineral Ridge parking areas where restrooms are available, but the best place to see them is the point halfway between the two parking areas. There is room for 4 or 5 cars to pull off the roadway on the sharp curve. From here, you can watch in both directions.

The majority of the Eagles perch in trees across Beauty Bay to the west. You will need binoculars to see them over there. A good spotting scope is much better. They also perch in trees over the road or directly above you on the hillside. You won't need binoculars for these or for the ones that may fly directly over your head.

You need to be patient. Take some lunch and wait for them to spot a dying Kokanee bobbing on the lake surface. The Eagles will dive out of the trees with their wings back, circle the fish once or twice, then swoop down extending their claws forward and folding their wings back for braking as it Looks the fish into it's claws like a ball player Looking a ball into the glove.

Then the fish snaps out of the water behind the Eagle as it thrusts its wings mightily downward to lift itself up and away from the water. It then flies to the limb of a tree to tear off small pieces for its meal. Sometimes, other Eagles chase it as it flies, trying to steal the prize.

Fishing activity is the most active in the mornings, but there is some activity throughout the day. December is the best month since that's when the Kokanee spawn and die. But, January might be OK. Enjoy!
