

BIRDS OF THE FOOTHILLS

We have a number of birds that visit the Foothills in the winter months, such as the Pine Grosbeak, Bald Eagle, Stellars Jay, Merlin, and the Bohemian Waxwings. This article will feature two of the most commonly seen wintering birds the Northern Shrike and the Rough-legged Hawk.

The Northern Shrike: This little bird is only 10" long, but holds it's own among many larger birds. it is gray, white, and black, with a heavy black eyeline. It has a hooked bill for tearing it's food apart. Its food consists of rodents, lizards and large insects as well as small birds. They hunt in open fields.

These little birds migrate 500 to 1,000 miles, all the way from Alaska, the Yukon, Northwest Territories, northern Canada and part of the Arctic. They arrive in the Foothills in mid-October and head back north in mid-April.

The Shrike is a songbird with many beautiful rambling songs. It sings in the fall when it arrives here and sings in the spring as if calling for a mate before starting its trip back north.

You will see this bird on power lines along the roads in the Foothills or hovering in one spot over a field while watching the movement of its prey in the grass before diving to grab it with its bill. It has typical songbird feet which are only strong enough for perching. Therefore, it must find some other way to hold its food while tearing small pieces off for its meal. The shrike finds a thorn in a Hawthorn tree or a barb on a fence to impale the mouse. It may also wedge the meal into a tight fork of two branches. Don't confuse the Shrike with the American Kestrel which is a little larger and very colorful. The Kestrel is a Falcon that hunts in the same manner as the Shrike.

The Rough-Legged Hawk: The name comes from the feathers on the legs all the way down to the talons. This large hawk and the Shrikes compete for the same space and rodents here as well as up north. In the north country, the one rodent they eat which we don't have here is the Lemming. Rough-legs generally arrive here a week or two after the Shrikes and return north a couple weeks after the Shrikes. They migrate in large loose flocks.

These hawks are the same size as our local red-tailed hawks, but are easy to distinguish by their markings and color. They are white, black, and brown. They have a white upper tail with a heavy black band near the end. Their neck is white and their breast is black. A rectangular

black wrist stands out on the underside of white wings when they fly and their white head is broken by a black eye line and whisker mark.

The Rough-Legged Hawks hunt just like the Shrikes - from poles, overhead wires or tree tops. They also hover in one spot just like the Shrikes.

Use your bird books and binoculars to study these wintering birds. They are our friends indeed.

New Book of Interest: Do you realize that 99% of the rain water and now that drains out of the Foothills winds up in the Little Spokane River via Peone and Deadman creeks?

A wonderful book has just been published by the Little Spokane Watershed Council. This book, titled, <u>Critters of the Little Spokane Watershed</u>, is available at bookstores or call 747-5738, or Ton Dexter at 468-2555. The book is 320 pages of text and offers a photographic tour of the watershed's native plants, fungi, birds and mammal wildlife habitats and their inter-relationships. Seventy-eight of the photographs were taken by Ron and Pat Dexter. More than 1,700 species all around us are listed including 215 bird species, 70 mammals and all known insects, etc. The book is \$25.00.

1996 Christmas Bird Count: Every year near Christmas, the Spokane Audubon members and volunteers spend one entire day counting all the birds they can find within a 15 mile diameter circle centered about Division and Francis. This circle includes a portion of the Foothills which starts on Fruit Hill Road and circles north by northwest through Peone Prairie.

Hal Hooper and I counted this area on Saturday, December 28. We had help from the Kruegers and Halsteads who called in the birds they counted that day in their yards. They each have wonderful bird habitats.

Hal and I covered 67 miles in 8 1/2 hours. Altogether, we identified 27 different species and The species included: 1,330 individual birds. Grosbeaks, Evening Dark-eyed luncos, Goldfinches, Song Sparrows, Slate Colored Juncos, Common Ravens, Northern Flickers, Black-Billed Magpies, House Finches, Downy Woodpecker, Sharp-Shinned Hawk, Rock Doves, California Quail, Mountain Chickadees, Red-Tailed Hawk, House Sparrows, Mourning Doves, Ring-Neck Pheasants, Rough-Legged Hawks, European Starlings, American Crows, Horned Larks, Gray Partridges, Red-Winged Blackbirds, Black-capped Chickadees, Great-Horned Owls.

In addition, there was one Raptor species and one Ancipiter species which we were not able to positively identify. Hal thinks the Ancipiter was a Coopers Hawk. I think it was a Goshawk! The Foothills Rural Association was established as a non-profit corporation under section 502(C)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code on December 12, 1983. The purposes for which the corporation is organized are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6; to protect the area from environmental depredation; to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents may assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area; to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident with the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20./year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

BURGLARIES REPORTED

Two residential burglaries were reported to the Community Crime Log (924-6590) in late November and December. Both were also reported to the Sheriff's Dept.

In November a home in the 16000 block of Foothills Road was entered in mid-day while a teen-ager as at home! The teen escaped through a window when a door was kicked in by the intruder. When the intruder realized, someone had been home, he left hastily though not empty handed!

A description of the intruder provided by the teen who escaped matched that of a person linked to as many as two dozen rural burglaries! Unfortunately, the Sheriff's office has been unable to locate where the suspect is staying. All goods are moved out of the area (probably out of state) before being fenced.

NOTE: This home is close to and easily visible from the road. It is passed by many other Foothills Road residents every day. While a formal Block Watch program is of limited effectiveness in a rural area like ours, residents are encouraged to be familiar with the types of vehicles operated by your neighbors. Most of us recognize many, if not most, vehicles belonging to folks in our immediate area. If you see a strange or unfamiliar vehicle at a neighbor's house, especially when you would normally not expect them to be home, try to get a good description

and the license plate number! This information could help solve a possible crime.

Also, it would seem wise to discuss with your children, who may be home alone at times, what to do in the event a stranger knocks on the door. In this case, the teen saw it was a stranger and decided to ignore the knock. The burglar then, figuring no one was home, kicked in the door!

On December 12, a house in the 12000 block of Moffat Road was entered between 11 AM and 4:30 PM. Items stolen included a TV and VCR. It appears the intruder(s) in this case entered through a sliding glass door.

Remember, never attempt to confront a suspected criminal! if you witness a crime in progress, call "911" and wait for the police.

Make sure your address is clearly visible from the road. Police, as well as fire and emergency personnel, waste valuable time if they are unable to locate where help is needed.

FOOTHILLS ON-LINE
